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Importantly, attributing causation of human characteristics to genetics generates a way of framing the issue that may have particular social implications. For example, when traits are understood to derive from genetic origins, they may be perceived as more immutable, "natural," and/or as something that "cannot be helped" (Stein, 1999).

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The Human Genetics Commission (HGC) and GeneWatch have raised the absence of an independent ethics committee to review research applications to the NDNAD with the government. 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Working memory (WM) is the ability to hold information in mind in the short-term and use it flexibly for behaviour. Not all items are represented equally in WM. Attention can be allocated to select and privilege relevant WM content.
